He brings valuable experience in **publicly funded training and support systems**; bridging the worlds of craftsmanship, cultural policy, and education.
- In 2018, he helped establish the Basket Weavers' Association and now serves on its board.
- **Erika Rudiková** has been passionate about basket weaving for over 14 years, practicing it as a dedicated hobby, and is also a member of the association.
- Most association members are over 65, while younger weavers tend to be more active and open to new ideas.
- Currently, ZkS has no professional basket makers among its members, as it's tough to make a living from basket weaving in Slovakia due to competition from cheap imported baskets, especially from Poland.

Brief Overview of Our Erasmus+ Project:

“GPS – Exploring New Paths in European Basketry”

The Erasmus+ project “GPS” is a European partnership dedicated to securing the future of basketry crafts. Working hand in hand with international partners from education, craft, design, and the cultural sector, the project aims to shape new paths for training, sharing knowledge, and inspiring the next generation in traditional basketry. We’re also passionate about making basketry and woven works a vibrant part of everyday life. That’s why we’re looking for creative, accessible ways for people to experience and learn basketry—and hope to connect with as many weaving traditions across Europe (and maybe beyond!) as possible.

At the heart of the project is one big question: How should craft training look today so it stays appealing, relevant, and flexible for young people—especially as society, technology, and culture continue to evolve? The project brings together **local expertise in craft with global perspectives**, encouraging rich exchanges between schools, cultural institutions, researchers, and working professionals.

Through hands-on workshops, open discussions, and collaborative development, we’re testing out **fresh approaches to training, learning, and partnership**. At the same time, the project helps strengthen **Europe-wide networks in basketry** and shines a light on the craft’s cultural, ecological, and creative importance.
